So, What do Snyder Firefighters do for "Real Jobs"?

Our Members, *ALL VOLUNTEER*, come from a variety of backgrounds and work in a variety of professions from Skilled Trades, Laborers, Corporate Finance, Legal, Marketing, IT, Medical Professions, Civil Servants, and many, many more. So what drives Snyder Firefighters to do what they do? Can I Still Volunteer If I Don't Have Any Previous Experience or Training?

That's Okay! We don't require you to have previous experiences to *volunteer* with the Snyder Fire Department. In fact, we'll pay for all of the training you'll need such as basic firefighting, EMT and CPR classes. There is no out of pocket cost for you to get trained!

In addition to paying for training, the Snyder Fire Department holds regular weekly drills and training on Wednesday evenings, and occasional weekly drills on Wednesday mornings. Our Officers spend a tremendous amount of time preparing exciting and educational training opportunities that feature a combination of Hands-On Training and Classroom based learning.

Additionally, the Snyder Fire Department provides all of the tools and gear you will need to succeed. Our *ALL VOLUNTEER* Members are issued top-notch turnout gear and tools. Our

Chiefs and Officers will make sure you are properly trained on all of your gear and equipment and that you are equipped with everything you need!

How do I reconcile My "Outside Career" and My Fire Service Career?

Becoming a *Volunteer Firefighter* with the Snyder Fire Department can, and will help your professional and personal development in a variety of ways regardless of chosen career path or industry.
